Fiscal Officer to Retire After 28 Years of Service

Joyce Robinson, who has served as the elected Fiscal Officer for Washington Township since March 1996, will officially retire on March 31, 2024 after 28 years of service. She has agreed to serve in an interim capacity as Deputy Fiscal Officer until a new Fiscal Officer is appointed by the Board of Trustees.

"I've loved serving as the Township's Fiscal Officer," Robinson said. "But I'm looking forward to having more time to spend with my family and grandchildren." When Robinson began her first term as Fiscal Officer in 1996, the Township's budget was approximately \$11.4 million and the population of Dublin/Washington Township was 24,456. Fast forward to 2024 and the Township's budget is

\$29.9 million, and the population of Dublin exceeds 50,000. "Dublin has grown tremendously during my tenure, and I'm fortunate to have dedicated staff who have assisted me in managing the significant financial responsibility that came with this growth." Washington Township employs 110 full-time, approximately 15 part-time employees, and operates four fire stations and an administration/training center.

Robinson takes pride in her accomplishments. "The Fiscal Office consistently maintains clean financial audits, sound investment practices, and healthy cash reserves necessary to respond to a growing community. I've been fortunate to work over the years with a number of elected Trustees, all of whom were committed to positioning the Washington Township Fire Department to respond to the unprecedented growth we've experienced over the last thirty years." Mike Keenan, who previously served as Trustee (1984–2004), agreed. "We always valued Joyce's input, she made sure we had the proper funding to manage the growth we experienced and she kept the Board on track with the budget." Current Trustee Charles Kranstuber, who has served since 2006, concurred. "Joyce has been a steady hand in safeguarding the finances of the Township and providing fiscal guidance to the Board of Trustees.

As her tenure comes to a close, Robinson added "I would like to thank all the residents for supporting the Township and for allowing me the opportunity to serve them for 28 years. It is an amazing

Simple Steps for Lawns, Water, and Your Community

(from our friends at Franklin Soil & Water Conservation District)

- Mow High: Longer grass is stronger grass: it shades the soils, prevents week seed germination, grows deeper roots, and better absorbs and filters rainfall.
- Mulch clippings: Leave clippings on the lawn. Grass clippings quickly breakdown
 and return valuable nutrients and organic matter back into the soil where
 earthworm and microbes thrive. Rich soil helps absorb and filter rainfall reducing
 erosion and run-off.
- Use the right fertilizer: Always choose a lawn fertilizer that is phosphorus-free, unless a soil test shows a need for this nutrient.
- Clean up: Keep grass clipping, leaves, and fertilizer off of sidewalks, roadways and other hard surfaces and out of our waterways.

Working Smoke Alarms Save Lives

Smoke alarms are essential tools for protecting your home or business from the dangers of fire. These small devices can make life-saving differences by alerting you to the presence of smoke, allowing you to react swiftly and effectively in the event of a fire.

Smoke alarms are designed to detect even the smallest traces of smoke, signaling the presence of a fire long before it becomes a major threat. Fires can occur any time of day; working smoke alarms provide continuous protection for your home or business.

Ideally, all homes should have working smoke alarms in every sleeping room, hallway, and on every level of your home including the basement. Smoke alarms should not be located within ten feet of cooking appliances to help eliminate false alarms. Mounting smoke alarms on a ceiling is the preferred location; wall-mounted smoke alarms should be no more than twelve inches from the ceiling.

Many smoke alarms are hardwired with a battery backup. Hardwired smoke alarms are often times interconnected, meaning if one alarm activates all the alarms within your home sound. Hardwired smoke alarms still have a backup battery in each device that needs replaced twice a year. Sealed battery smoke alarms have a sealed battery with a ten-year life span, it is important to know if your alarms are of the sealed battery type or have a changeable battery.



Alarms should be tested once a month using the alarms test button. Everyone should understand the sound the alarms make. Having and practicing an escape plan is important for everyone to know and understand. Replace your smoke alarm if they are more than ten years old. The smoke alarms manufactured date is located on the backside of each smoke alarm.

The Washington Township Fire Department is always willing to answer any questions you may have regarding your smoke alarms and assist with battery or alarm replacement if need be. Ohio Weather

We all joke about how Ohio's weather is always changing...and it's true! Know what to do before weather hits and where to go if you're caught in severe weather. According to the National Weather Service, there are several tips to make yourself & those around you prepared for severe weather.

BEFORE: Being prepared is key!

Be Aware of What's Happening Locally: Stay alert and be aware of the forecast when making plans.

Make a Plan: Have a weather plan that you share with your family.

Prepare Your Home: Keep trees and branches trimmed near your house. If you have time before severe weather hits, secure loose objects, close windows and doors, and move any valuable objects inside or under a sturdy structure.



DURING: If severe weather strikes, follow your action plan.

At Your House: Go to your secure location if you hear a severe thunderstorm warning. Damaging wind or large hail may be approaching. Take your pets with you if time allows.

At Your Workplace or School: Stay away from windows if you are in a severe thunderstorm warning and damaging wind or large hail is approaching. Do not go to large open rooms such as cafeterias, gymnasiums or auditoriums.

Outside: Go inside a sturdy building immediately if severe thunderstorms are approaching. Sheds and storage facilities are not safe. Taking shelter under a tree can be deadly. The tree may fall on you. Standing under a tree also put you at a greater risk of getting struck by lightning.

In a Vehicle: Being in a vehicle during severe thunderstorms is safer than being outside; however, drive to closest secure shelter if there is sufficient time.

AFTER:

Stay Informed: Continue monitoring local weather. More severe thunderstorms could be headed your way.

Contact Your Family and Loved Ones: Let your family and close friends know that you're okay so they can help spread the word. Text messages or social media are more reliable forms of communication than phone calls.

Assess the Damage: After you are sure the severe weather threat has ended, check your property for damages. Contact local authorities if you see power lines down. Stay out of damaged buildings.

Help Your Neighbor: If you come across people that are injured and you are properly trained, if needed, provide first aid to victims until emergency response team members arrive.



Spring/Summer Fire Safety

It's that time of year! The sun is shining, the weather is warming up and fire safety is as important as ever. Now is a great time to do a little "spring cleaning" around the house.

Here's a simple "Spring Cleaning: Fire Safety Edition" Checklist:

- Change batteries in all smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors. Replace any equipment that is older than 10 years including smoke alarms, carbon monoxide detectors and fire extinguishers.
- Do you have a fire extinguisher? Fire extinguishers should be in the kitchen and near heating/utility appliances at a minimum.
- Clean under & around appliances, especially in the kitchen and laundry room.
- Dry vegetation around your house can be a quick, fire starter. Trim any tree branches or bushes that are near your home.

- Store gasoline for mowers in a safe place.
- Maintain a 10-foot clear 'fire zone' around structures.
- Check outdoor electrical outlets and appliances.
- Service your grill while inspecting propane tanks and lines for leaks while storing propane in a safe place.
- Keep a 100-foot garden hose with an attached nozzle connected and ready for immediate use.
- Don't overload electrical sockets.



Hydrant Flushing

Annual Hydrant flushing will be occurring throughout May. It is expected that the flushing will take up to six weeks and will be occurring daily throughout our service area. There are two main reasons why hydrants are flushed. First, a fire hydrant is in essence a valve and to make sure it works when needed it is important to "exercise" a fire hydrant. Additionally, hydrants are flushed to remove mineral deposits that may occur inside the pipes.

Just a reminder, hydrant flushing may cause water to become rusty or discolored. If this happens, run your faucets until the water is clear. It is possible for laundry water to also be impacted when washing clothes due to the potential of rust.

This is also a great time to make sure that your hydrant is visible. Please avoid planting landscaping including bushes or flowers. In the event of an emergency, our crew needs to be able to access a hydrant quickly.



Training

Washington Township Fire Department conducts many different training scenarios both at the fire stations, administration offices, and out in the community. The goal is to ensure our crews are ready and prepared when called upon in an emergency.


